How do I apply for a One+ VET Program?

1. Choose a course from this brochure that interests you.
2. See your VET leader to discuss suitability and any requirements that must be met.
3. Obtain an “**Application for Cross Campus Study / Shared Learning VET**” form from your school’s VET Coordinator.
4. Complete the form, check it with your VET leader before submitting it to the leader listed on the form for your school.
5. If you do not have a USI (unique student identifier), go to [unique student identifier](#) and generate one as this will be required for enrolment.
6. See your VET leader for course enrolment forms, complete these and return them as soon as possible. Only those who have **returned** all course enrolment forms, that are completed correctly, to their VET leader **will** have a place reserved in courses.
7. You will be advised of the outcome by the start of Term 4 by your VET leader (some courses may not run should the minimum number of students not be reached).

Frequently Asked Questions

What is VET?

VET is an acronym for **V**ocational **E**ducation and **T**raining. When studying VET, students gain accreditation to work in relevant fields with a mix of theory and practical work studied in courses. Some courses may also have work placement requirements. The courses are delivered by trainers from approved **R**egistered **T**raining **O**rganisations (RTOs).

Who are the One+ schools?

Gleeson College, Golden Grove High School and Pedare are part of the alliance referred to as One+. This collaboration allows all our partnerships schools to offer a greater scope of choice, including hosting VET courses on our shared site.

Can VET count towards the SACE?

VET can be counted towards SACE however, students will need to discuss this with their VET leader as there are limitations on how much can be included if they wish to gain an ATAR. Information regarding VET and SACE can also be found at the SACE board website: [VET in SACE](#)

How can studying VET benefit me?

Successful completion of a VET qualification can either qualify students to work in their chosen field or start them on the path to doing so.

Students can study in the field of their chosen career and complete their SACE.

Some courses provide on the job training (those with work placement components).

VET courses can be a pathway to further certificate courses, traineeships, apprenticeships or employment.

What will it cost to study VET?

Course costs may vary depending on whether a student is eligible for subsidies in the course being studied. The VET booklet may provide a guide of the cost however these are subject to change. The costs should be discussed with the schools’ VET leader.

Is there a work placement requirement in the course?

Some courses may have a work placement requirement. This work placement complements the course and develops students' skills in the area, potentially improving their employability. Any work placement requirements should be noted on the page relevant to the course in the VET booklet. Students can also check with their VET leader. If there is any work placement, students will be required to arrange their own transport.

Are there any SACE subjects that may complement my VET studies?

Depending on your desired outcome, subjects with similar content themes are a sensible choice. Students may also study [Workplace Practices](#) or a [customised Integrated Learning](#) course (subject to availability on site). Cross campus study may also be an option. This can be discussed with your course counsellor and/or VET leader before or at the time of subject selection.

Will completing a VET course effect my ATAR?

Successful completion of a certificate III or higher may contribute to an ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank).

Will completing a VET course effect my TAFE entry?

Successful completion of a SACE and/or a VET qualification is generally enough to meet TAFE course entry requirements. It is best to check the entry requirements of each course to determine if there are any other requirements. Your counsellor and/or VET leader can assist with this before or at the time of subject selection.

Will I study this in addition to the school subjects?

A VET course is studied in conjunction with school subjects, however your VET course will replace one of your school subjects. It will not be in addition to a full load. E.g. at Year 12, students study four full year subjects. A student completing a VET course will study the VET course and up to three other full year subjects. Your course counsellor and/or VET leader can discuss this with you around the time of subject selection.

Can this lead me to a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship?

Yes, VET courses are one way to enter into a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship. Information about apprenticeships can be found at: [Australian Apprenticeships](#). See your VET leader to discuss requirements around these pathways.

If I study a VET course, am I required to complete a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship?

There is no obligation to enter into a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship. You may study VET to enter directly into a career, to upskill, due to interest in the course material or as part of a university pathway.

Who do I ask for more information?

Students and families should speak with their respective school's VET and Student Pathways leaders if they have further questions. That can be done in person by making an appointment (contact your school administration) or via email (see email addresses below)

INDUSTRY IMMERSION GUIDE

Most certificate courses require students to have had some industry immersion. This refers to having ~~experience~~ ^{exposure}, insight, or an introduction to the career path. Below are examples of some suitable Industry Immersion options that will help to qualify a student for a course, and may assist with gaining the relevant subsidies. There is also a guide as to how much Industry Immersion is required however students should seek the advice of their respective schools VET/Student Pathways Leader to confirm Immersion requirements are met.

Training Plan (Sample)

This qualification provides a pathway to the primary trades in the construction industry with the exception of plumbing. Trade outcomes are predominantly achieved through an Australian Apprenticeship and this qualification allows for inclusion of skills suited for entry to off-site occupations, such as joinery as well as carpentry, bricklaying and other occupations in general construction.

This qualification is designed to introduce learners to the recognised trade callings in the construction industry and provide meaningful credit in a construction industry Australian Apprenticeship.

The qualification has core unit of competency requirements that are required in most Certificate III qualifications. The elective options are structured to allow choice from areas of trade skills as an introduction to a range of occupations.

To undertake the Certificate II in Electrotechnology you should have a sound understanding of both **English** and **General Mathematics**. You will also attend industry immersion activities with PEER to satisfy VETRO evidence requirements prior to commencement.

VFSS (VET For School Students)

This course is a subsidised under the Government of South Australia's Flexible Industry Pathway initiative. To be eligible for access to a subsidised training place in an approved course, a school student must meet the following criteria. They must be:

- An Australian citizen or New Zealand citizen or,
- A permanent Australian resident or,
- An eligible visa holder
- Reside in South Australia

AND ARE

- Enrolled in Year 10, 11 or 12 and employed in a Training Contract that combines VET and school-based curriculum including SACE

OR ARE

- Enrolled in Year 11, 12 or 13 and are 16 years of age or turning 16 years of age in the current year of that enrolment, and
- Are undertaking SACE or equivalent and,
- Have completed a preparatory VET pathway

Training providers must sight evidence to demonstrate the eligibility criteria has been met. Further detailed information on the range of evidence the Department accepts as demonstration of having completed a preparatory VET pathway, refer to the VET for School Student Approved Evidence for Completion of a Relevant VET Pathway Guide.

To be eligible for a subsidised school-based apprenticeship or traineeship, school students must be in year 10, 11 or 12 at the time of commencement. School students below year 10 are not eligible to access a subsidised training place under a contract of training arrangement.

Concession Eligibility

Students who hold any of the following concession cards at the time of their enrolment may be eligible for a concession fee:

- Hold a health care card
- Hold a pensioner concession card
- Hold a pensioner concession card issued by the Department of Veteran Affairs
- Is a prison inmate, a detainee, on remand, held in a South Australian institution in connection with the commission of an offense, or a child in a South Australian detention center older than 16 years.

Please note: Proof of eligibility for concession must be demonstrated at the time of enrolment. If the concession is valid for the full enrolment period, then all eligible units commenced within that period attract the concession rate. If the concession is valid for part of the enrolment period, then only eligible units commenced prior to the expiry of the concession attract the concession rate.

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Certificate III Individual Support – Aging

Students who complete this qualification are skilled to work in community, home or residential care facilities under the supervision of a team leader or as a member of a team. They provide personal support to the aged and/or those with a disability or additional needs. The course can be used as a steppingstone in a pathway to areas such as Nursing or Allied Health.

- One day per week on campus with some commitments in school holidays, possible early course start date in January 2024.
- Some training days at training organisations facilities (selected dates over duration of the course, advised in advance)

- Approximately 120 hours or more of work placement
