
Context Statement

Golden Grove High School caters for students from 7-12. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 1569. Golden Grove High School is classified as Category 5 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 3% Aboriginal students, 14% students with disabilities, 5% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background, 1% children/young people in care. Performance Summary NAPLAN Proficiency


In 2023, the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) - a Commonwealth Independent statutory authority - announced changes to NAPLAN performance reporting. This new way of reporting by ACARA that NAPLAN results from 2023 will not be comparable to previous years. The new approach replaces the previous numerical NAPLAN bands and the national minimum standard.



Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.

Chairperson's Report 2023

The 2023 school year commenced at Golden Grove High School with approximately 1639 students, 195 staff, and with Peter Kuss as the Principal.

Our Governing Council, in partnership with the principal and the leadership team, assists in managing the non-teaching areas of the school, including the provision of grounds, facilities and services. During the 2023 year, our Governing Council members were involved in various areas of school management and attended school events as follows:

Finance Advisory Committee

Our finance advisory committee consists of the Principal, Business Leader, Staff Rep, Chairperson and Treasurer. Meetings are held twice per term to review the school finances prior to presentation at Governing Council. Interim and final annual budgets are also reviewed at various times during the year. 2023 saw the ongoing refinement of school finance reports, along with the change to a more simplified format for our material and services charges.

Parent Engagement Committee

Our parent engagement committee, which meets three times a term, consists of one of the Assistant Principals, several Governing Council Reps, and parent volunteers. One of the highlights from 2023 would have to be the schnitzel fundraiser night. This was held at the Brahma Lodge Hotel, was reasonably well attended, and helped the Parent Engagement Committee raise funds for new yard equipment for our students.

Grounds Facilities and Services Committee

Our Grounds, Facilities, and Services committee, which meets once a term, consists of the Principal, Business Leader, Grounds Staff, and Governing Council Reps. During the year our committee discussed numerous items, mainly from a repairs and maintenance point of view. It is likely that a Facilities Committee with staff involvement will be established in 2024 to maximise the outcomes with budget spending.

Year 12 Graduation Night

Our Governing Council Chairperson attended the Year 12 graduation night held at the school. This was a great event, with Federal, State, and Local Government members attending. Importantly, all students graduating were individually recognised. With the Governing Council being involved behind the scenes helping to ensure the right facilities are provided for a good teaching and learning environment, it was good to be there to also celebrate their learning achievements.

Year 7 Parent and Caregiver Information Night - BBQ

Several of our Governing Council members assisted with hosting a BBQ for the Year 7 Parent and Caregiver Information Night. The community BBQ was held to welcome the Year 7 students and their families who will be joining the school in 2024. Students and their families then attended the formal presentations in the DRMC.

Asia Oasis - Ginger Lemongrass Festival

In 2023, Golden Grove High played host to the first ever Asia Oasis festival to be held this side of the city. The Ginger Lemongrass Festival as it was officially titled, was held over a three-day period, and saw our school oval transformed into a place of entertainment and fabulous food experiences. Our school community had exclusive access during the first day, after which the wider community could then take part. The lantern display especially at night was quite a sight.

One+ Combined Boards Dinner

Our Governing Council members were invited to the annual One+ Combined Boards Dinner in August 2023. The One+ plus alliance is a unique collaboration between Golden Grove High, Gleeson College, and Pedare Christian College. Being on the same campus,

this alliance enables the sharing of resources, facilities, and learning. The dinner presented as a worthwhile opportunity for the Governing Council members of all three schools to interact with one another.

An important part of any school community is the engagement and involvement of parents. One of the ways to become involved is to be a volunteer at the school. The volunteers work in various areas of the school and enable the successful running of our school programs and committees. In recognition of our volunteers, each year Blair Boyer MP presents the Wright Volunteer Award. The 2023 award was presented to Cheryl who provided valuable support to the finance team during the transition of their staff.

In recent years our school has been quite fortunate in receiving some major investment funding for new facilities, including the new middle school and year 12 buildings. The original school which opened in 1989 however does require maintenance. One example of this maintenance would be the need to upgrade the Quadrangle Area (which is currently under review). Preliminary plans for a new gymnasium are also being considered. These types of projects will need significant financial support.

We should all thank our Principal, Peter Kuss, the leadership team, our teachers, and support staff for continuing to provide a high standard of teaching and learning. This is by no means a simple task when recognising the number of students, staff and parents involved.

I would also like to take this opportunity to personally thank all 2023 Governing Council members for their hard work and support. Our team is a great group of people that work well together, making effective decisions for the benefit of the whole school community. Finally, thanks for the opportunity to be Chairperson. 2023 was my first year on the Governing Council, and I look forward to continuing my involvement in 2024.
